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Five Reasons Tebow is Good For Public Schools

1- Increased pool of talent

By adding home schoolers, public schools will be able to tap into the local talent that could dramatically increase the skill and success of teams. 2- Diversifies student body

Public schools, and their students, will have their experiences broadened by the diverse ideas, values, and life styles that home schooled students bring to the table. Extra-curricular activities are about more than competition – they are about friendship and growth, and through the expansion of eligible students, everyone participating can have a richer and more valuable experience.

3- Increases sports and activities

Not only will local schools see an influx of talent, with additional players, many of whom have diverse interests, those schools will be able to field more activities, and a wider variety of sports. Many home schooled students participate in agriculture competitions, play unusual olympic sports, or have a deep interest in obscure and unique academic fields.
